We are glad to welcome you to St. James Cathedral. We are following the Center for Disease Control and City of Chicago guidelines for the COVID-19 pandemic, and so:

- At this time, **ALL** are required to wear masks except clergy and lay leaders when they are speaking or singing.

- For the time being, Communion will continue to be served in one kind (the bread) at standing stations instead of the altar rail.
- Singing is allowed if you remain masked.

FIRST READING

A Reading from the Book of Job. (42:1-6, 10-17)

Job answered the Lord: "I know that you can do all things, and that no purpose of yours can be thwarted. Who is this that hides counsel without knowledge?" Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know. 'Hear, and I will speak; I will question you, and you declare to me.' I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes." And the Lord restored the fortunes of Job when he had prayed for his friends; and the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before. Then there came to him all his brothers and sisters and all who had known him before, and they ate bread with him in his house; they showed him sympathy and comforted him for all the evil that the Lord had brought upon him; and each of them gave him a piece of money and a gold ring. SECOND READING

A Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews. (7:23-28)

The former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but he holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues forever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them. For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect forever.

NICENE CREED



And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.


