We are glad to welcome you to St. James Cathedral. We are following the current Center for Disease Control and City of Chicago guidelines for the COVID-19 pandemic, and so:

- For cathedral services, the wearing of protective masks is now optional.
- For your information, all cathedral staff and the Cathedral Choir are fully vaccinated and continue to test weekly.
- For the time being, communion will continue to be served in one kind (bread only) at standing stations.

HOLY COMMUNION

Let the priest know if you would need a gluten-free wafer. If you prefer to receive a blessing, come forward and cross your arms over your chest. We are also happy to bring Communion to you if you are unable to come to the altar rail. Please let the usher know if this would be helpful for you.



HOLY GOSPEL

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. (10:1–11, 16–20)

All Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus chose seventy-two others and sent them out in pairs ahead of him into every town and place where he planned to go. He said to them, "There are a great many people to harvest, but there are only a few workers. So pray to God, who owns the harvest, that he will send more workers to help gather his harvest. Go now, but listen! I am sending you out like sheep among wolves. Don't carry a purse, a bag, or sandals, and don't waste time talking with people on the road. Before you go into a house, say, 'Peace be with this house.' If peace-loving people live there, your blessing of peace will stay with them, but if not, then your blessing will come back to you. Stay in the same house, eating and drinking what the people there give you. A worker should be given his pay. Don't move from house to house. If you go into a town and the people welcome you, eat what they give you. Heal the sick who live there, and tell them, 'The kingdom of God is near you.' But if you go into a town, and the people don't welcome you, then go into the streets and say, 'Even the dirt from your town that sticks to our feet we wipe off against you. But remember that the kingdom of God is near.'

"Whoever listens to you listens to me, and whoever refuses to accept you refuses to accept me. And whoever refuses to accept me refuses to accept the One who sent me." When the seventy-two came back, they were very happy and said, "Lord, even the demons obeyed us when we used your name!" Jesus said, "I saw Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Listen, I have given you power to walk on snakes and scorpions, power that is greater than the enemy has. So nothing will hurt you. But you should not be happy because the spirits obey you but because your names are written in heaven."


Reader Why do we share this bread and wine?




Reader All Why do we follow Jesus Christ?




