

This Year's Lenten Appeals

As part of our Lenten discipline of almsgiving, we have named two recipients for this year's Lenten Appeal: Trilogy Behavioral Healthcare and Cathedral Counselling Center.

Read more below to learn how these organizations offer hope and healing in a hurting world.



Trilogy Behavioral Healthcare

Trilogy is a nonprofit with over 50 years of experience serving low-income people with serious mental illness in Chicago and the surrounding suburbs. Many of those served are experiencing homelessness, poverty, addiction, chronic health conditions and other issues, and some are facing many of those issues simultaneously. Trilogy's treatment plans support the whole person and empower each client to define and guide their recovery. Trilogy is helping nearly 4,000 individuals each year to maintain their stability in the community and avoid hospitalizations, stabilize after a crisis, receive counseling, therapy and primary care, access benefits including income and permanent housing, maintain their independence and more. Trilogy also supports people who live in nursing homes or rehabilitation facilities to transition to more independent living. Trilogy operates drop-in centers where food and clothing are provided to people who are un-housed and/or food insecure. Trilogy's work supports people in their journey to recovery and saves lives every day.



Cathedral Counseling Center

The Cathedral Counseling Center was founded at St. James Cathedral in 1974 by The Rev. Anthony Henllan-Jones, a clinical social worker and Episcopal priest. CCC was housed at St. James Cathedral for many years until it moved to 50 E. Washington St. in downtown Chicago when it outgrew the space at St. James. CCC helps people make sense of their lives during difficult times through professional, affordable, sliding scale mental health services. Experienced clinicians participate in the CCC mission by contracting their services at a portion of the market rate. They also build and support the professional community through their commitment to high standards and continuing education, training, and supervision opportunities. CCC is a member agency of Episcopal Charities & Community Services.

CHILDREN IN WORSHIP

Children are always welcome here, and this service is designed to actively engage them in worship. There is an open space to the front right of the pews for children 5 and under to play under your supervision and a changing station for parents of our youngest members under the church in the restrooms.

HOLY COMMUNION

We offer God's gracious gift of Holy Communion to anyone who wishes to receive it. If you prefer to receive a blessing, come forward and cross your arms over your chest. Let the priest or minister know if you would need a gluten-free wafer or alcohol-free wine. We are also happy to bring Communion to you if you are unable to come to the altar rail. Please let a priest know if this would be helpful for you.

PARKING

On Sundays, reduced-rate parking is available at R.O.W. Parking Garage (50 E. Ohio) for \$2 for up to six hours from the time of entering the garage. Discounts are also available for all-day parking at Ohio Ontario Self Park (33 W. Ontario) for \$10. To receive a reduced-rate parking voucher, please go to the Welcome Center desk in the narthex.





Liturgy of the Word

FIRST READING

A Reading from the First Book of Samuel. (16:1–13)

The Lord said to Samuel, "How long will you continue to feel sorry for Saul? I have rejected him as king of Israel. Fill your container with olive oil and go. I am sending you to Jesse who lives in Bethlehem, because I have chosen one of his sons to be king." But Samuel said, "If I go, Saul will hear the news and will try to kill me." The Lord said, "Take a young calf with you. Say, 'I have come to offer a sacrifice to the Lord.' Invite Jesse to the sacrifice. Then I will tell you what to do. You must appoint the one I show you." Samuel did what the Lord told him to do. When he arrived at Bethlehem, the elders of Bethlehem shook with fear. They met him and asked, "Are you coming in peace." Samuel answered, "Yes, I come in peace. I have come to make a sacrifice to the Lord. Set yourselves apart to the Lord and come to the sacrifice with me." Then he set Jesse and his sons apart to the Lord, and he invited them to come to the sacrifice.

When they arrived, Samuel saw Eliab, and he thought, "Surely the Lord has appointed this person standing here before him." But the Lord said to Samuel, "Don't look at how handsome Eliab is or how tall he is, because I have not chosen him. God does not see the same way people see. People look at the outside of a person, but the Lord looks at the heart." Then Jesse called Abinadab and told him to pass by Samuel. But Samuel said, "The Lord has not chosen this man either." Then Jesse had Shammah pass by. But Samuel said, "No, the Lord has not chosen this one." Jesse had seven of his sons pass by Samuel. But Samuel said to him, "The Lord has not chosen any of these." Then he asked Jesse, "Are these all the sons you have?" Jesse answered, "I still have the youngest son. He is out taking care of the sheep." Samuel said, "Send for him. We will not sit down to eat until he arrives." So Jesse sent and had his youngest son brought in. He was a fine boy, tanned, and handsome. The Lord said to Samuel, "Go, appoint him, because he is the one." So Samuel took the container of olive oil and poured it on Jesse's youngest son to appoint him in front of his brothers. From that day on, the Lord's Spirit worked in David. Samuel then went back to Ramah.



HOLY GOSPEL

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. (9:1–7)
All Glory to you, Lord Christ.

SERMON

Mr. Matthew Berryman Executive Director of Episcopal Charities

In 2018, The Episcopal Church approved trial-use worship language to include broader ways for talking about our relationships to God and each other, possibly to be included in an updated Book of Common Prayer. We will be trying out these new prayers and responses during the Sundays in Lent.

NICENE CREED

Presider Do you believe in God the Father?

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of

all that is, seen and unseen.

Presider Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

All We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of

the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and

the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

Presider Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

All We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the

Father, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the

resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.






Reader Why do we share this bread and wine?
