Welcome to St. James Cathedral!

We are glad to welcome you to St. James Cathedral. We are following the Center for Disease Control and City of Chicago guidelines for the COVID-19 pandemic, and so:

- At this time, ALL are required to wear masks except clergy and lay leaders when they are speaking or singing.
- For your information, the cathedral staff and choir have all been fully vaccinated.
- No one should feel obligated to pass the Peace by shaking hands. The recent practice of passing the Peace with a nod or a "peace sign" is entirely acceptable.
- For the time being, Communion will continue to be served in one kind (the bread) at standing stations instead of the altar rail.
- · Singing is allowed if you remain masked.

HOLY COMMUNION

We offer God's gracious gift of Holy Communion to anyone who wishes to receive it. During this time communion will be received in one kind (the bread). Let the priest know if you would need a gluten-free wafer. If you prefer to receive a blessing, come forward and cross your arms over your chest. We are also happy to bring Communion to you if you are unable to come to the altar rail. Please let the usher know if this would be helpful for you.

On Sundays, reduced-rate parking is available at R.O.W. Parking Garage (50 E. Ohio) for \$2 for up to six hours from the time of entering the garage. HOLY GOSPEL

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. (21:25–36)
All Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "There will be signs in the sun, moon, and stars. On earth, nations will be afraid and confused because of the roar and fury of the sea. People will be so afraid they will faint, wondering what is happening to the world, because the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then people will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. When these things begin to happen, look up and hold your heads high, because the time when God will free you is near!"

Then Jesus told this story: "Look at the fig tree and all the other trees. When their leaves appear, you know that summer is near. In the same way, when you see these things happening, you will know that God's kingdom is near.

I tell you the truth, all these things will happen while the people of this time are still living. Earth and sky will be destroyed, but the words I have spoken will never be destroyed.

Be careful not to spend your time feasting, drinking, or worrying about worldly things. If you do, that day might come on you suddenly, like a trap on all people on earth. So be ready all the time. Pray that you will be strong enough to escape all these things that will happen and that you will be able to stand before the Son of Man."








Reader Why do we follow Jesus Christ?


