ST. JAMES MEALS

Neighbors and volunteers of St. James gather twice per month to shop, cook, and open our dining room for guests to enjoy the hospitality of a sit-down meal. Much more than a feeding program, this ministry focuses on lifting up the dignity of our fellow human beings.

Joining the ReVive Center for Housing and Healing, St. James coordinates shopping for families-in-need for Christmas. From single homebound individuals to families of 10, everyone sponsored receives a Christmas dinner and a gift from their wish list.

As the only Bombas Socks distributor in River North, St. James not only supplies clean, warm socks to people in need but also handles the logistics of sharing socks with ministry partners and other social service organizations throughout the city.

This liturgy has become universally popular because its magic transcends denomination and creed, speaking to people of all faiths or none at all. Whoever you are or whatever you believe, whether you come to church regularly or this is your first time, at St. James Cathedral, you are not just welcome - you belong. CHRISTMAS EVE FAMILY EUCHARIST WITH CHILDREN'S PAGEANT on Wednesday, Dec. 24 at 4 p.m. Children from the cathedral community and neighborhood are invited to present an interactive Christmas story during this family-friendly Christmas Eve celebration. Festive carols are led by the Cathedral Choristers and members of the Cathedral Choir. Children are invited to participate in every aspect of this service.

LESSONS & CAROLS FOR CHRISTMAS EVE on Wednesday, Dec. 24 at 7 p.m. We recount the story of the Nativity through words of scripture, beautiful choral music sung by the Cathedral Choir and Choristers, and beloved Christmas Carols sung by the entire congregation. This service does not include a sermon or Eucharist.

SOLEMN EUCHARIST on Wednesday, Dec. 24 at 10 p.m. The Cathedral Choir leads the music of the service. Organ prelude begins at 9:30 p.m.

CHRISTMAS DAY on Thursday, Dec. 25 at 10 a.m. A smaller, quieter celebration of the Nativity with music led by members of the Cathedral Choir.

St. James has long been recognized for excellence and leadership in sacred music. The Cathedral Choir sings Sundays at 11 a.m., for major feast days and other special services, and at Choral Evensong, a service of song, stillness, and scripture on the first Sunday of the month (October through June) at 4 p.m. The Cathedral Choristers sing on Sunday mornings at the 9 a.m. Family Eucharist and for an abbreviated form of Choral Evensong every Wednesday at 5:45 p.m. during the school year.





EIGHTH LESSON Matthew 2:1–11

Reader The wise men are led by the star to Jesus.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.


NINTH LESSON John 1:1-14

Reader Saint John unfolds the great mystery of the Incarnation.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.


